## 2024 COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT

## **Executive Summary:**

Independence Health System-Clarion Hospital is proud to present its 2024 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) Report. In accordance with federal IRS regulations §1.501(r)-3, this assessment is conducted to better understand the population it serves as well as the health issues that are of greatest concern within its community. This report summarizes a comprehensive review and analysis of health status indicators, demographic and other qualitative and quantitative data from the primary service area of Clarion Hospital.

The purpose of this report is to offer a meaningful understanding of the most pressing health needs for the Clarion County community and to guide planning efforts to address those needs. The CHNA provides useful information for public health and health care providers, policy makers, social service agencies, community groups and organizations, religious institutions, businesses, and consumers who are interested in improving the health status of the community and region.

Findings from this report will be used to identify, develop, and target hospital and community-driven initiatives to improve the health and quality of life of residents in the community. We hope the information presented is a useful community resource and encourages additional activities and collaborative efforts that improve the Health Status of the community.

## **2021 Community Health Needs Assessment Follow Up**

In March 2024, Clarion Hospital conducted a 3-year evaluation of its CHNA implementation strategies from the 2021 assessment.

Clarion Hospital's priority health areas for 2021-2024 were:

- **Physical Activity and Nutrition**-Support and improve physical activity and nutrition education/programs to promote healthy lifestyles and reduce chronic disease.
- **Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse**- Expand partnerships to enhance behavioral health and substance abuse programs within the community.
- **Food Insecurity**-Address the issue of food insecurity by giving community members access to healthy foods and nutrition resources.

## **Initiatives Implemented**

### **Physical Activity and Nutrition**

#### **1. Promoted and organized Lifestyle Coaching classes:**

- Presented at the YMCA, Independence Health System-Clarion Health and Wellness Center, and other community sites monthly.
- Classes included a facilitator to assist with the Zoom platform, cooking demonstrations and food tasting.
- Marketed to the YMCA membership and participants and other community organizations.
- Initially, YMCA participation in Lifestyle Coaching classes was restricted to approximately 10 individuals due to staffing shortages and ongoing COVID concerns. However, the program transitioned to a virtual format during the pandemic. As the health system recovered, a hybrid approach emerged, integrating virtual educational events with in-person cooking demonstrations at the Independence-Clarion Health and Wellness Center. By January 2023, our delivery methods expanded to include video-on-demand. Clients registered online and received a video link and electronic handouts via email, empowering them to access and engage with content at their convenience.
- The Weight Management and Diabetes series included virtual and in-person support groups for additional education opportunities. This platform increased our ability to engage the community in science-based health education, decrease health inequities and increase health literacy. From January 1, 2021, through July 31, 2023, Lifestyle Coaching provided ~812 educational contact hours to people living in the greater Clarion County region. Of the 812 educational contact hours ~ 44 were in person events, ~ 239

were video-on-demand and ~529 were virtual educational. Lifestyle Coaching participants included community members, patients, and staff.

**2. Developed the Exercise Institute**

- Initiated an exercise program, administered by licensed physical therapists located at the Health & Wellness Center and Clarion Rehabilitation Services, Inc.
- Created specific and targeted marketing strategies for the community and physician referral processes.
- Led community members/patients in individualized exercise programs focusing on cardiovascular health, strength training, flexibility strategies and balance activities.
- Education, home exercise, and referrals to local exercise facilities were also part of the program.
- During this time-period, twenty-seven people were evaluated and given structured exercise programs to help manage chronic diseases and other health issues. These services continue to be offered to physical therapy patients who suffer from chronic diseases in addition to their referral diagnosis.

**3. Continued previous effective health initiatives: Teddy Bear Clinic, Health Wise Employee Wellness Program, Multiphasic Blood Screening, and other school-based wellness programs.**

- The Teddy Bear Clinic an elementary school outreach program, offers curriculum on the importance of healthy food choices and physical activity. This program was temporarily put on hold from 2021-2022 due to pandemic restrictions but was resumed in 2023. During that time, seven different schools were visited, impacting over 500 students and 35 educators.
- Health Wise Employee Wellness Program: Clarion Hospital employees are encouraged to participate in this program which offers biometric screenings, health risk assessments, individualized health coaching, virtual wellness classes, and the tracking of steps, sleep, and exercise. By participating in this program, employees receive the benefit of reduced insurance premiums as an incentive. Over 50% of employees have participated in the wellness program each year.
- A community multiphasic blood screening event resumed in 2022 and continued through 2023. This outreach program temporarily was halted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. One event was held in 2022 and two were held in 2023. 600+ individuals participated in the screenings, and results were sent to their respective physicians for further evaluation if needed.
- The hospital partnered with area schools to share health and wellness information at various school-based events. Over 500 individuals were impacted by these events by receiving materials and/or participating in wellness activities.

## Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse

- **Partnered with the Armstrong Indiana Clarion Drug & Alcohol Commission to offer ARMOT (Addiction Recovery Mobile Outreach Team) services to patients.**
  - a. Through this program, over 460 Narcan kits were distributed and nearly 70 community members were assisted when they visited the emergency room.
- **Promote Education of Hospital Staff**
  - a. The Addiction Recovery Mobile Outreach Team (ARMOT) program was imbedded into the monthly hospital orientation for new employees. During the monthly orientation, ARMOT members were encouraged to round on the nursing units to provide reinforcement of referral process and answer staff questions.
  - b. Members of Clarion Hospital participate in monthly meetings with the ARMOT team to engage in discussions regarding referral procedures and referral statistics. Strategies to increase referral acceptance were discussed.
  - c. Educational programs sponsored by ARMOT were shared with nursing and other hospital staff.
  - d. Nursing Grand Rounds presentation on Illicit Drug Use were held for staff to participate.
- **Recovery in Motion – Partner with AICDAC** – The mission of this program is to promote long-term recovery from substance use disorders through education, advocacy and recovery support services, resulting in healthier individuals, families and communities. Classes were free and held at the YMCA. Clarion Hospital residents provide the education for participants. Topics included but are not limited to nutrition, stress management, and the benefits of exercise in recovery. The program began in January 2022, and to date, fourteen individuals have completed it.
- In 2023, the Emergency Department completed a remodel that included an increase from 9-bed capacity to a 13-bed capacity. Patients seeking evaluation prior to behavioral health services can often incur longer waiting times for acceptance to these services. The additional beds allow for more patient privacy, safety, and comfort for all patients.
- In 2023, in response to identified needs for behavioral health services, a behavioral health specialist was imbedded into the primary care office at the BHS Health and Wellness Building. Patients needing short-term outpatient services can see the therapist at their primary care office. Those needing longer term services can be seen and receive care while awaiting longer term provider acceptance.

## Food Insecurity

***Defined as the inability to afford nutritionally adequate and safe food. It is evident when families or individuals lack access to food, depend on food assistance programs, skip meals, substitute nutritious foods with less expensive alternatives and seek assistance from soup kitchens and food pantries.***



**The health system has developed two important programs, Lifestyle Coaching and the Food Institute to help address food insecurity and nutrition education:**

### **Lifestyle Coaching**

Chronic diseases plague our community and are straining healthcare resources in the area. Additionally, health inequity and disparities can be amplified in rural areas. To address these challenges, Independence Health System offers the Lifestyle Coaching program. The Lifestyle Coaching program's mission is to provide evidence-based lifestyle education without barriers to the patients, employees, and the communities we serve to decrease health disparities and increase health literacy. The Lifestyle Coaching curriculum focuses on the mitigation of cardiometabolic risk factors to help our clients manage the chronic diseases that plague our communities, including type 2 diabetes, obesity, and cardiovascular disease.

The Lifestyle Coaching program has 3 core areas of focus: weight management, diabetes lifestyle education and heart healthy lifestyles seminars. Supplemental courses are offered to complement the goals of reducing disease related to lifestyle. The following programs are offered:

- **Weight Management:** based on Volumetrics principles and includes twelve video-on-demand lessons plus virtual support groups.
- **Diabetes:** four-week series that teaches the Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialists Seven Behaviors for People with Diabetes (ADCES7 Behaviors). This program is available in-person, virtually and as video-on-demand.
- **Heart Healthy Seminars:** includes the American Heart Association Life's Essential 8™, Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (DASH), Mediterranean Lifestyle, and Plant-Forward Eating which address healthy diet and lifestyle for the prevention and management of cardiovascular disease. These programs are available virtually, in-person, and will be available as video-on-demand soon.
- **Supporting programs for cardiometabolic health:** include but are not limited to Reducing Barriers to Physical Activity, Nicotine Cessation, Brain Healthy Lifestyles, Mindfulness for Brain Health, Menu Planning, Nicotine Cessation, and Stress Management.

The educational programs are delivered in person and via Zoom. Despite having the option of virtual or in-person events, the program received continuous requests for on-demand viewing options. Based on the strong demand for videos, the Lifestyle Coaching program piloted a video-on-demand option for our Weight Management program. The 12 lessons were professionally videotaped and sent out biweekly with alternating biweekly virtual support groups for discussion and questions. The new on-demand viewing platform for our weight management program exceeded expectations. Since the release of the view-on-demand platform in January 2023, the program participation has quadrupled. This model allows the participant to access education when it is convenient for them and receive additional support as needed from virtual support groups. Due to the impressive response for video on demand, we are expanding this platform to include the Diabetes series, Mediterranean, DASH, AHA (American Heart Association) Life's Essential 8™, and Plant-Forward Eating. We anticipate increased enrollment as the video-on-demand platform is expanded.

Since January 2021, the Lifestyle Coaching Program has provided over 800 educational contact hours in the Clarion area. The breakdown via platforms is: 5% in person events, 30% video-on-demand and 65% virtual educational.

### **Food Institute:**

The Independence Health System opened the Clarion campus Food Institute in November 2021. The program focuses on promoting access to healthy foods to address the food insecurity issues that also plague our communities and contribute to chronic diseases. System wide education was held for all ambulatory providers and office staff with special attention to the subspecialties of cardiology and endocrinology. The education included an explanation of how food insecurity affects health outcomes, a video demonstration on empathic questioning of the hunger vital signs, and the referral process to enroll patients in the Food Institute. The hunger vital sign questions are: Do you have difficulty accessing fresh fruits and vegetables? Do you utilize food banks or pantries to feed your family? and/or Do you run out of money before the end of the month to purchase food? A “yes” answer to any of these questions triggers a referral.

Upon referral patients complete an intake form to identify their food security concerns, assess their personal environment as it relates to their ability to cook and store food, dietary concerns such as allergies and special diets, and other Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) needs. Patient needs such as transportation or access to cooking utensils are assessed during intake to eliminate barriers, ensuring that patients have the necessary resources to fully engage and complete the program.

During each monthly visit, the patient meets with a Food Institute staff member to receive food shares, recipes, and nutrition education on the following topics: MyPlate, food safety, label reading, heart healthy eating, reducing added sugars, choosing healthy fats, reducing sodium, menu planning and shopping on a budget. Patients receive ingredients and recipes for 10 monthly meals that feed a family of four. Each recipe has a cost analysis, and our average cost is ~\$1.50 per serving. Recipe cost analysis and education on sustainability of healthy eating is an important educational focus of the program. After patients graduate from the 4-month program they are enrolled in ongoing monthly graduate classes. Graduate class includes a nutrition lesson, cooking demo with the recipe and ingredients to take home. This is also an opportunity to check in with patients and provide additional support as needed.

The program also screens patients and refers them to diet related disease management lifestyle education classes free of charge. There are several evidence-based disease management educational opportunities within our Lifestyle Coaching program as described above.

The program was initiated on November 1, 2022. As of December 31, 2023, there have been 230 referrals. Below are the monthly visits to the Clarion Food Institute to date.

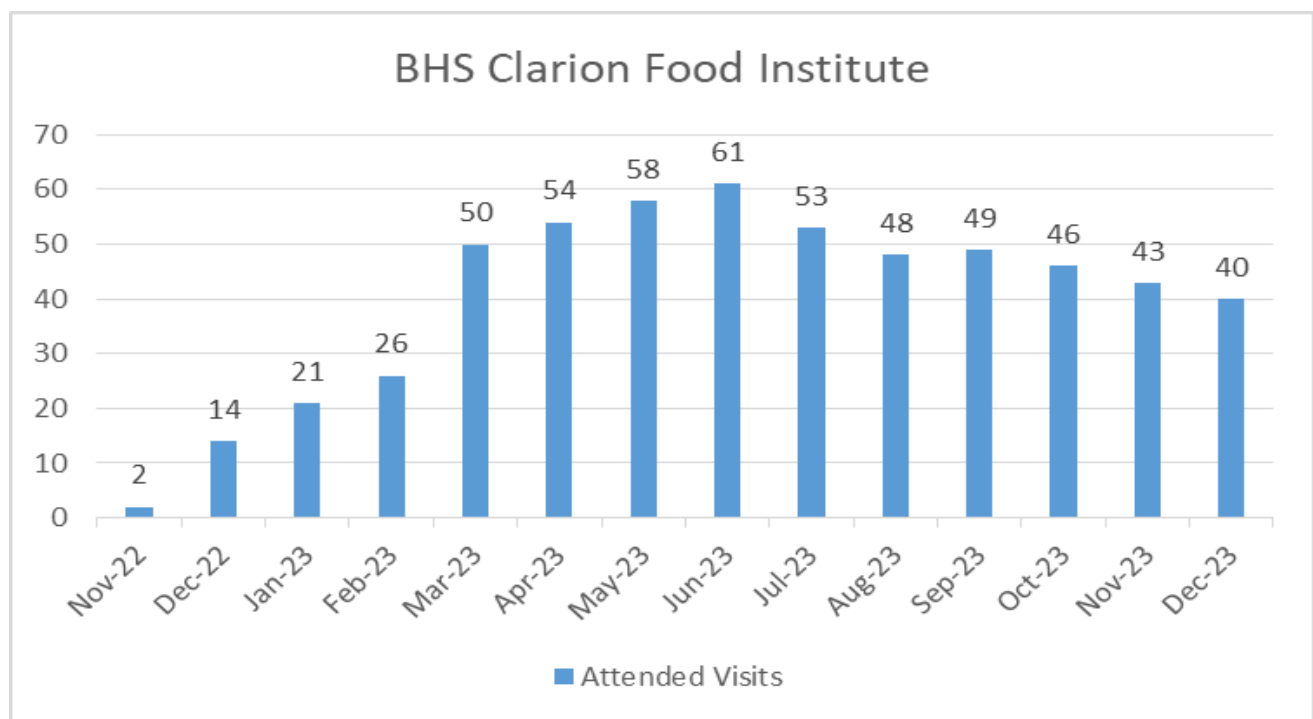

These initiatives aim to champion ongoing health education and address the growing demand for healthcare resources in the community.



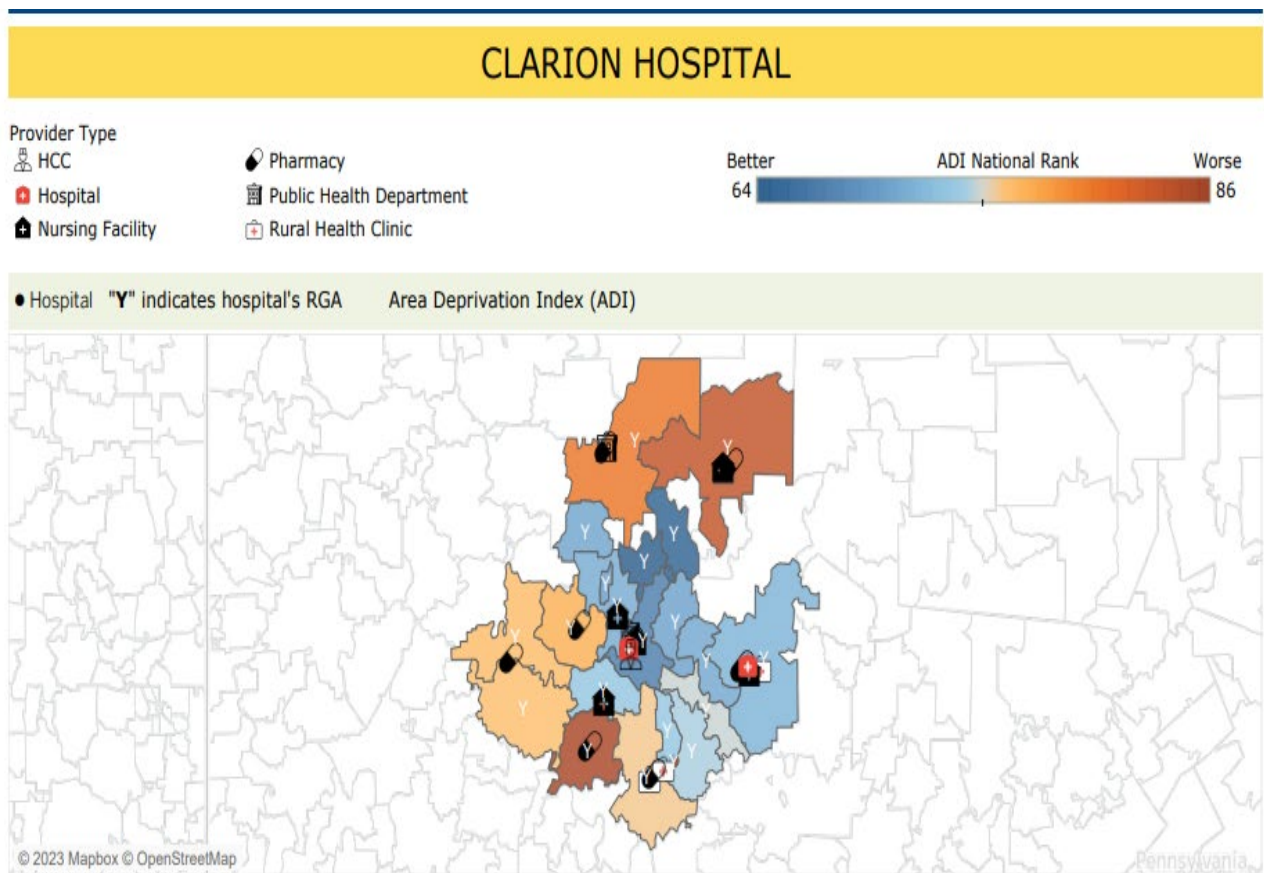
## **Rural Healthcare Model**

In 2021, Clarion Hospital joined the Pennsylvania Rural Health Model (PARHM). The PARHM is an alternative payment model that transitions away from fee-for-service to a global budget methodology. This allows for the alignment of incentives for value-based care and the opportunity for rural hospitals to transform the care they deliver to better meet community health needs and focus on the health of the population within the Hospital's defined rural geographic area. Clarion Hospital's transformation goals have focused on the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation's (CMMI) goals relative to care coordination, improving access to health care, and improving quality of care all of which led to improving population health within the community.

## **Care Coordination**

A care coordination program was developed, to organize and facilitate, healthcare services to ensure the needs of patients are met efficiently with the goal of improving patient outcomes, enhancing satisfaction, and optimizing resource utilization within the healthcare system. The hospital hired a Care Navigator who meets with patients and their families to help coordinate post-hospital care for hospitalized patients with high care needs. The Navigator follows patients for 90 days following discharge from the hospital and works to identify needs and fill gaps with supporting community resources. Currently, the Care Navigator follows patients with a diagnosis of COPD, Pneumonia, Respiratory Failure, Diabetes and Heart Failure. Additional patients may be followed based on physician recommendation. The top ten most prevalent conditions for Clarion Hospital in 2021 were identified as Diabetes (24.1%), vascular disease (15.5%), Heart Arrhythmia (14.4%), Congestive Heart Failure (12.4%), COPD (12.1%), Mental Illness (10.1%), Cancer (10.1%), Morbid obesity (6.8%), Dementia (6.6%), and Rheumatoid Arthritis and Inflammatory Connective Tissue Disease (6.4%).

The Area Deprivation Index (ADI) is a measure that assesses the socioeconomic status of a specific geographic area, considering specific factors like income, education, employment, and housing. It helps to identify areas facing higher levels of deprivation or disadvantage. The ADI for Clarion Hospital's geographic region is listed below.

A Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) tool was identified and implemented to gather data on the needs of patients with chronic diseases. Initially, the tool focused on five key areas of SDOH: Safety, Housing, Transportation, Utilities, and Food. Additional questions have since been incorporated to enhance understanding of specific needs within these categories.

Collaboration with community resources have also been strengthened to facilitate better health management and potentially reduce Emergency Department visits and hospital readmissions. This collaboration involves engaging with local agencies and community organizations to establish a more diverse resource network.

## Improving Access to Care

In 2022, the hospital obtained and utilized a waiver that allowed for the implementation of a post-acute care unit within the hospital that provides both Inpatient Rehabilitation and Swing bed services for patients within the community.

The Independence Health System-Clarion Health and Wellness Center was designed to support a distinct move from illness care to wellness care with a focus on prevention and education, lifestyle behaviors, and other SDOH issues. This center includes:

- Primary Care Offices
- Specialty Care Offices including Women's Health, Cardiology, Pulmonology
- Space equipped for both in-person and telemedicine services.
- Sponsorship and promotion of site-specific and health screenings.
- Multiphasic Blood Screenings
- Multiple free cancer screening programs were provided in 2022 and 2023 that include Breast & Cervical (2022 & 2023), Lung (2023), Prostate (2023). 60 patients in total received the free screenings.

- The Breast Navigator program was implemented to provide care coordination for patients following positive ultrasound testing. In 2022, 79 patients received assistance from the navigator, and this number increased to 90 patients in 2023.
- Women's Imaging Center with 3Dmammography that includes Walk-in Wednesdays for patients who don't have an appointment. In 2022, 842 mammography tests were performed and in 2023, 2995 tests were completed.
- Radiology services
- Phlebotomy services
- Cardiac Rehabilitation Program – 248 patient visits in 2022 and 1136 patient visits in 2023.
- A Pulmonary Rehabilitation Program was initiated in October 2023.
- A lifestyle coach was hired to provide Lifestyle management programs including exercise science, cooking, nutrition, and smoking cessation classes.
- A Behavioral Health specialist was hired to provide Integrated Behavioral Health services within primary care practice in October 2023.
- The team worked with community transportation providers to improve access by having the Health and Wellness Center by adding transportation routes with regular stops at the center.
- In September 2022, BHS Primary Care Clarion implemented walk-in hours Monday-Friday from 8 am to 10 am. In 2022, 49 patients received care in the walk-in clinic. In 2023 this number increased to 553 patients.
- A pilot telehealth clinic was started in Rimersburg to provide access to primary and specialty care to individuals in the community. The clinic had telehealth equipment to enable cardiology

appointments for patients unable to travel to Clarion or Butler hospitals. Phlebotomy services were also provided.

- Faster Care Virtual services were marketed as a method to provide in-home urgent care telemedicine to patients.

### **Improving the Quality of Care Provided**

- Implementation of a Cardiac Rehab Program.
- Implementation of Pulmonary Rehab Program.
- Implementation of the Food Institute.
- Implementation of Lifestyle Coaching programs.
- Implementation of Health and Cancer Screenings within the community.
- Standardization of care among acute hospital patients and post hospitalization care for specific chronic conditions.
- Care coordination to better identify patient needs and connect patients with existing services within the community.
- Development of a patient registry whereby patients with chronic diseases are followed 90-days post discharge to ensure social determinants of health are addressed. At a minimum, patients receive contact at 30, 60, and 90 days post-discharge from the hospital.

## **2024 Community Health Needs Assessment**

This community health assessment was conducted throughout the Summer and Fall of 2023. Qualitative and quantitative data was gathered from community members and stakeholder organizations in the Clarion County region, employees, and providers of Independence Health System-Clarion Hospital, along with other multiple secondary data sources.

### **Methods**

The assessment committee gathered input from individuals and organizations that represent the broad interests of the Clarion region; this was completed through a range of methods.

- Multiple meetings were held with the Independence Health System-Clarion Hospital Community Assessment team to identify the top health priorities within the primary service area of Clarion County.
- Independence Health System- Clarion Hospital collected health data from County Health Rankings, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, World Life Expectancy, PAYS (Pennsylvania Youth Survey), and US Census.
- 208 community members and 16 stakeholders completed electronic and paper surveys to provide additional data to survey the health of the people in the Clarion County Region.
- Focus groups met and discussed the data collected from all the sources above. The main themes that arose throughout the discussion were mental/behavioral health, food insecurity, and access to care, transportation, substance abuse, diabetes, obesity, and childcare.

## Population Served

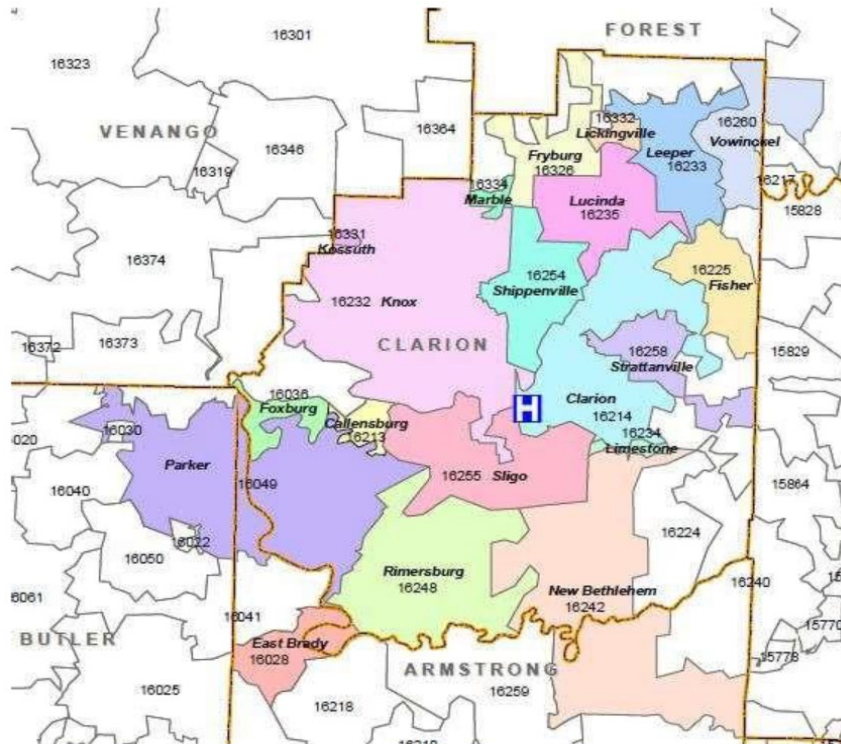


Figure 3: Clarion Hospital Primary Service Areas

The primary service area for Independence Health System- Clarion Hospital was identified as Clarion County, Pennsylvania. Most patients and visits originate from the Clarion area and surrounding counties. The individuals that come from surrounding counties to receive more advanced services include Venango, Forest, Armstrong, and Jefferson. For secondary data collection, Clarion County was determined to be the community served. This is illustrated in Figure 3.

- The overall age-adjusted death rate in Clarion County is greater than the state's average.
- The leading cause of death in Clarion County is heart disease. Cancer is the second leading cause of death followed by accidents.
- The heart disease mortality is 196.3 per 100,000 people which is higher than Pennsylvania at 176.2 per 100,000 people.
- The cancer mortality rate is 171.5 per 100,000 people, compared to 157.8 per 100,000 people in Pennsylvania.
- Diabetes mortality is also higher in Clarion County at 29.7 per 100,000 in comparison to the state level of 21.1 per 100,000.
- Of note is that community member and stakeholder surveys identified heart disease and diabetes as primary health concerns within the community.
- Clarion County's age-adjusted death rates for accidents, cerebrovascular diseases, chronic lower respiratory diseases, influenza and pneumonia, and septicemia align closely with the Pennsylvania data.

- Obesity and overweight prevalence among adults in Clarion County raises concerns regarding the community's overall health status. 40.0% of adults in Clarion County are classified as obese, compared to the Pennsylvania average of 32.0%. Additionally, 75.0% of adults in Clarion County are identified as overweight, compared to the Pennsylvania state average of 67.0%. These statistics align with community members' perceptions as they identified obesity as a health problem in Clarion County.
- Clarion County has a high percentage of individuals who smoke at 24.0%, as compared to the Pennsylvania state average of 17.0%.
- While Clarion County faces challenges with a higher smoking rate and obesity compared to the state average, there are areas where the county aligns with the state's health metrics. For instance, the prevalence of asthma and doctor visits for routine checkups in Clarion County is similar to the Pennsylvania average. Additionally, the rates of arthritis, diabetes, self-reported fair or poor general health, and the percentage of uninsured adults are comparable to the state. These observations suggest that while there's room for improvement in certain aspects, Clarion County maintains a baseline similar to the state in terms of other health indicators.

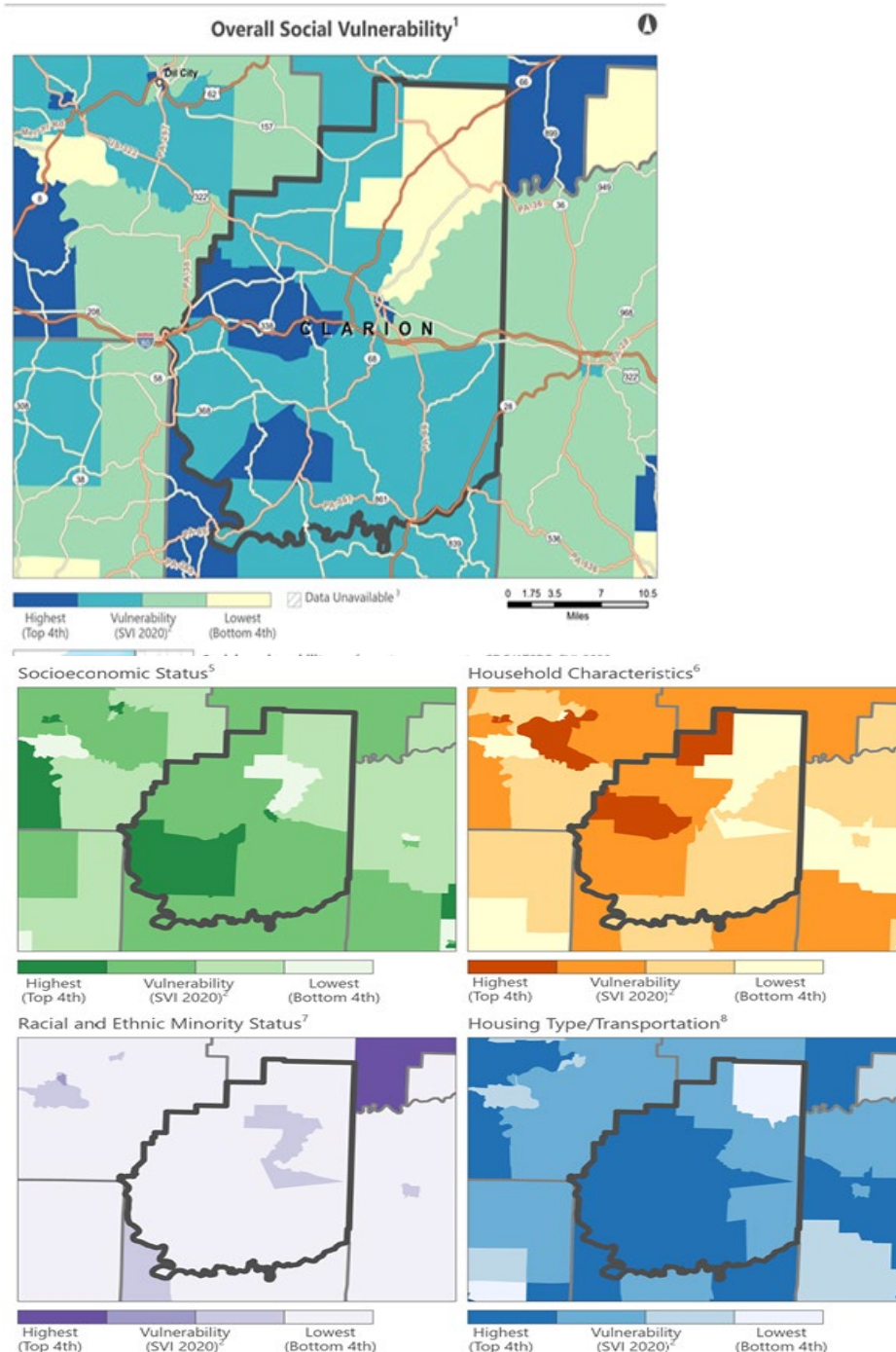


Figure 4: Social Vulnerability Index

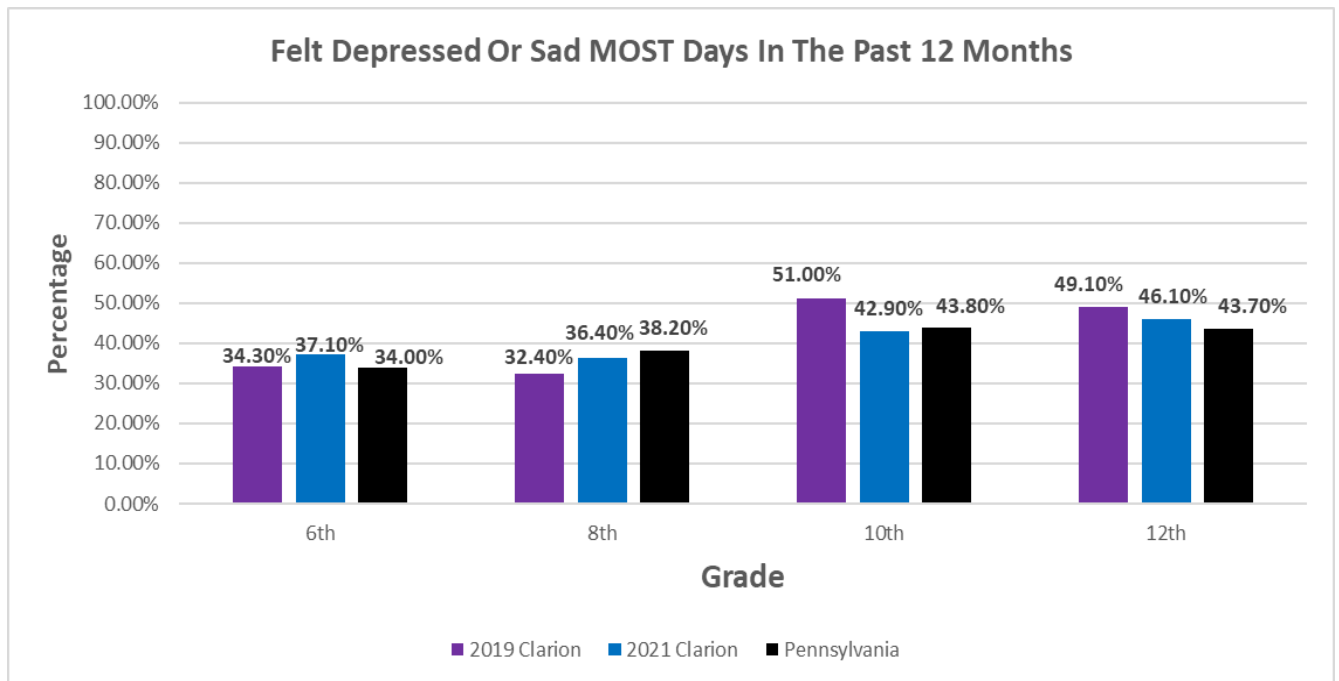
- **Social vulnerability:** is a community's capacity to prepare for and respond to the stress of hazardous events ranging from natural disasters such as tornadoes to human threats such as toxic chemical spills.

- There are four themes that summarize the SVI, which are socioeconomic status, housing characteristics, racial and ethnic minority status, and housing type/transportation.
- The figure on the top is the overall SVI. This combines all the themes to show a comprehensive assessment.
- This data was collected in 2020 and the overall SVI for Clarion County was 0.3657 which is on a 0 to 1 scale with 0 being the lowest vulnerability and 1 being the highest. A score of 0.3657 SVI indicates a low to medium level of vulnerability.
- Socioeconomic Status (.4809) and Housing Type/Transportation (.6935) have the highest vulnerability within Clarion County.



## **Pennsylvania Youth Survey (PAYS) Data Analysis**

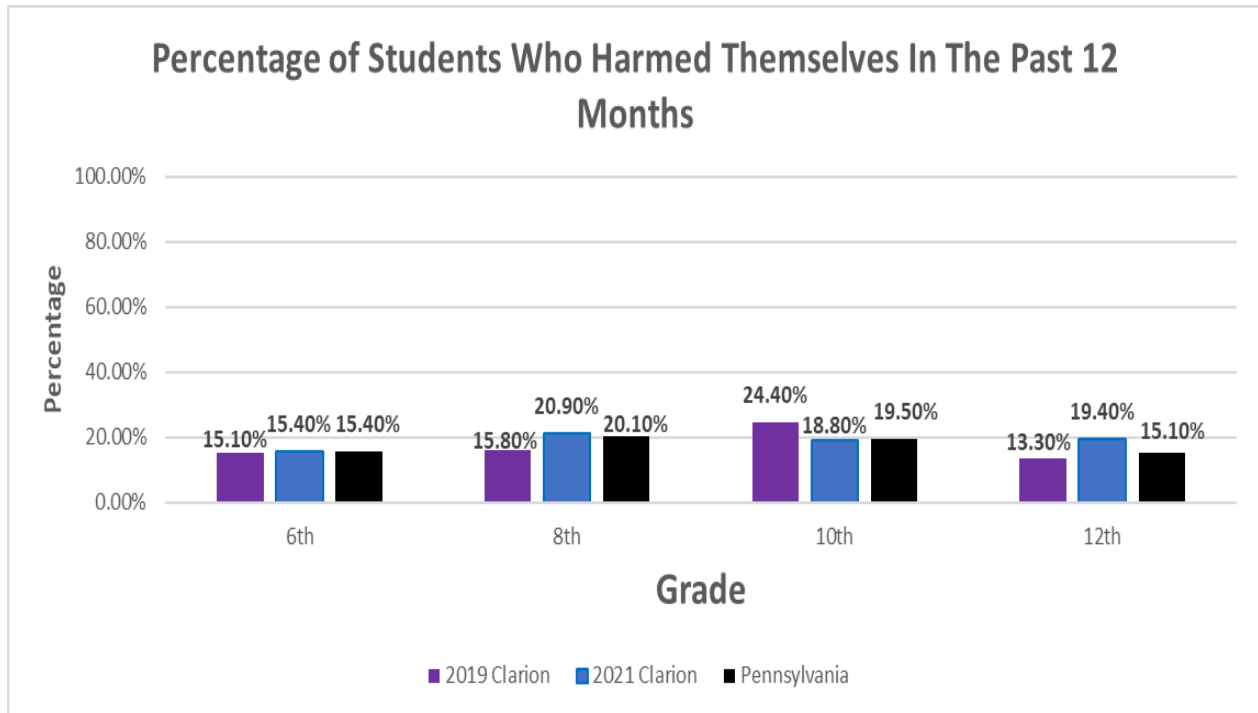
Since 1989 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has administered a biennial Pennsylvania Youth Survey (PAYS) to gather information about students' attitudes and behaviors regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use to help address the causes of antisocial behavior. Over the last several survey administrations, PAYS has added additional questions on illegal prescription drug use, vaping, e-cigarette use, gambling, depression, and suicidal ideation. This comprehensive survey assesses these issues both at the county and state levels. In response to growing concerns voiced by various stakeholders regarding escalating substance abuse and mental health issues among adolescents and young adults in Clarion Schools, the PAYS initiative plays a crucial role in providing the quantitative data as well as valuable qualitative data to bolster our understanding of these pressing issues. Presented below are a sample of comparative graphs illustrating the 2021 PAYS data specific to Clarion County and the broader state of Pennsylvania in comparison to the 2019 PAYS data.



**FIGURE 5: PAYS-Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Have Felt Depressed Or Sad Most Days In The Past 12 Months**

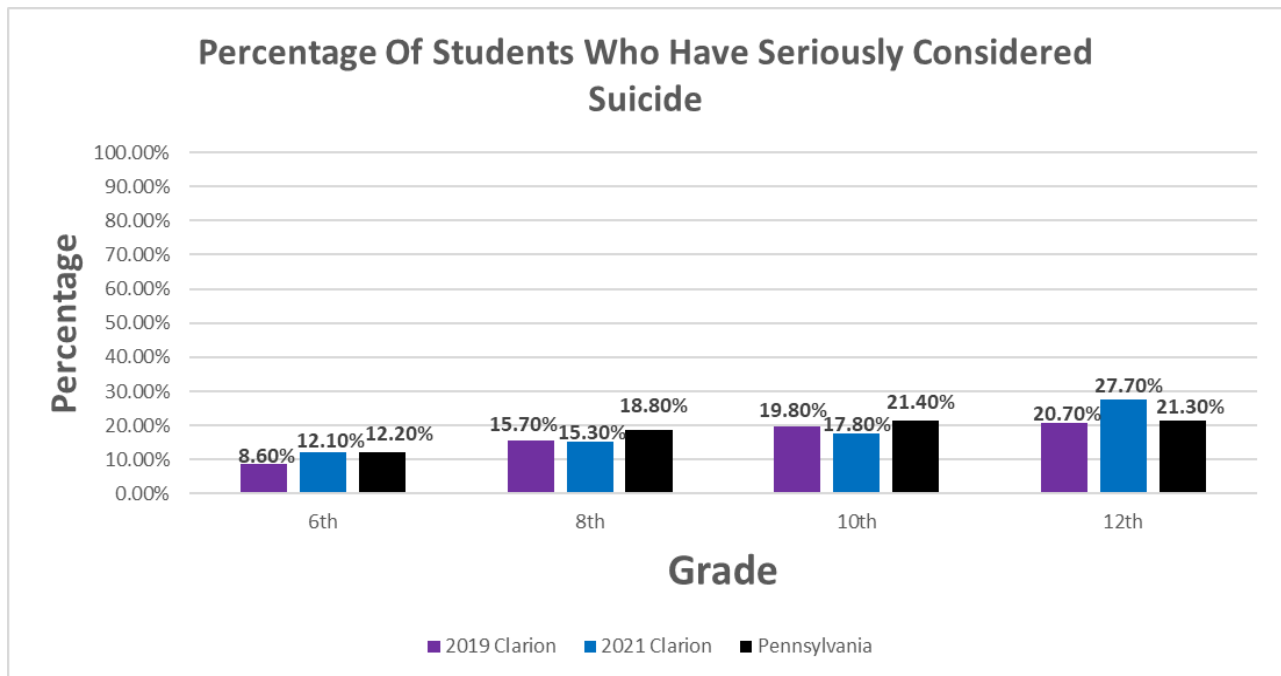
There are some noted shifts in the 2021 PAYS data as compared to the reported PAYS data in 2019.

- 42.9% of the county 10th-graders reported that they felt depressed or sad most days in the past 12 months as compared to 51% in 2019 (an 8.1% improvement).
- 46.1% of the county 12th-graders reported that they felt depressed or sad most days in the past twelve months as compared to 49.1% in 2019 (a 3% improvement).
- 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders however reported that they felt sad or depressed most days in the past twelve months at 37.1% and 36.4% respectively, both an increase from 2019 of 2.8% and 4% respectively.
- 6<sup>th</sup> graders in Clarion County felt depressed or sad 37.1% of the time, this is higher than in 2019 (34.3%) and 3.1% higher than the average 6<sup>th</sup> grade Pennsylvania youth.



**FIGURE 6: PAYS-Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Harmed Themselves In The Past 12 Months**

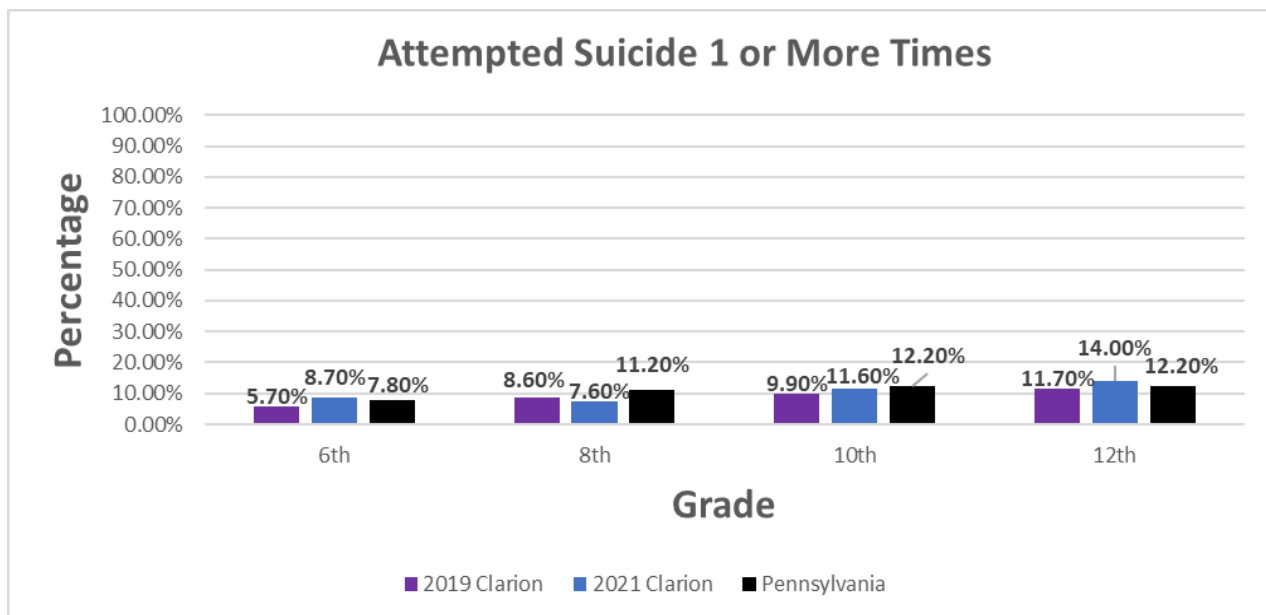
- Although the 2021 percentage of 8<sup>th</sup> graders engaging in self-harm is minimally higher than the state average, it is an increase of 5.1% from the comparable 2019 data.
- For 12<sup>th</sup> graders, the county average is above the state average by 4.3 % and it is 6.1% above the county average from 2019.



**FIGURE 7: PAYS-Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Have Considered Suicide Within Their Lifetime**

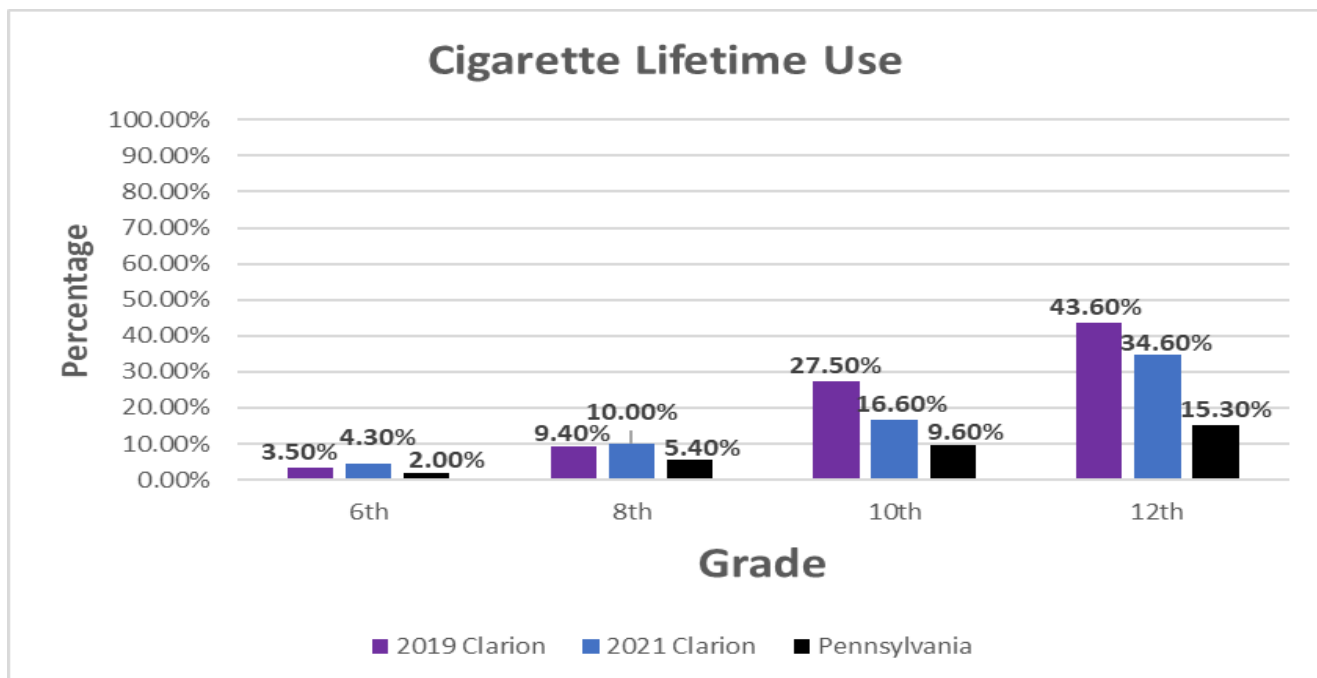
Of concern is the percentage of students across all grades surveyed who have seriously considered suicide.

- Within the 6th-grade cohort, there is a noticeable uptick of 3.5% in comparison to that same group in 2019 (8.6%).
- Almost 28% of 12<sup>th</sup> grade students in Clarion County have considered suicide. This exceeds the state average of 21.3%.
- In 2021, both 8<sup>th</sup> grade and 10<sup>th</sup> grade Clarion County students who seriously considered suicide dropped lower than in 2019, and lower than the Pennsylvania state average.



**FIGURE 8: PAYS- Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Have Attempted Suicide 1 Or More Times**

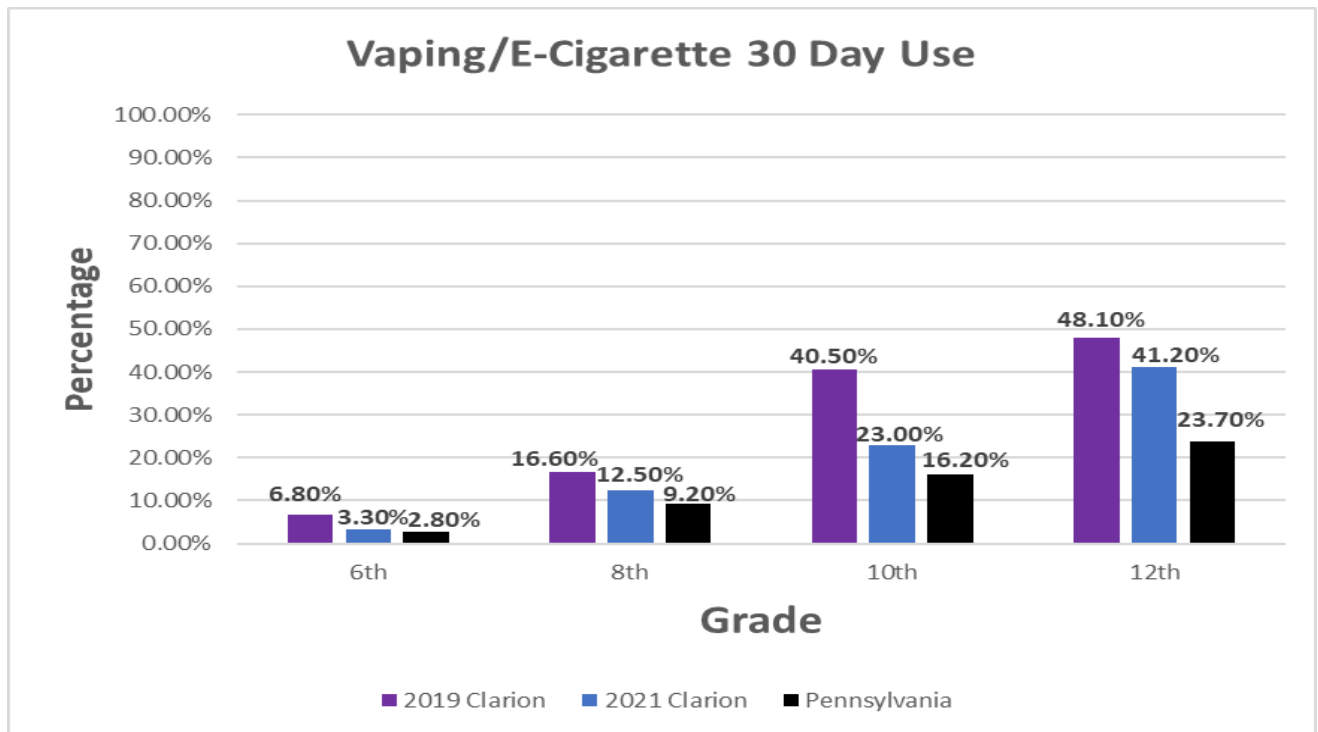
- The percentage of students who have attempted suicide is less than the state percentage for both 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> graders.
- The percentage of 12<sup>th</sup> graders of Clarion County who have attempted suicide at least once is 1.8% higher compared to the state and 2.3% higher than in 2019.



**FIGURE 9: PAYS-Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Reported Use Of Cigarettes In their Lifetime**

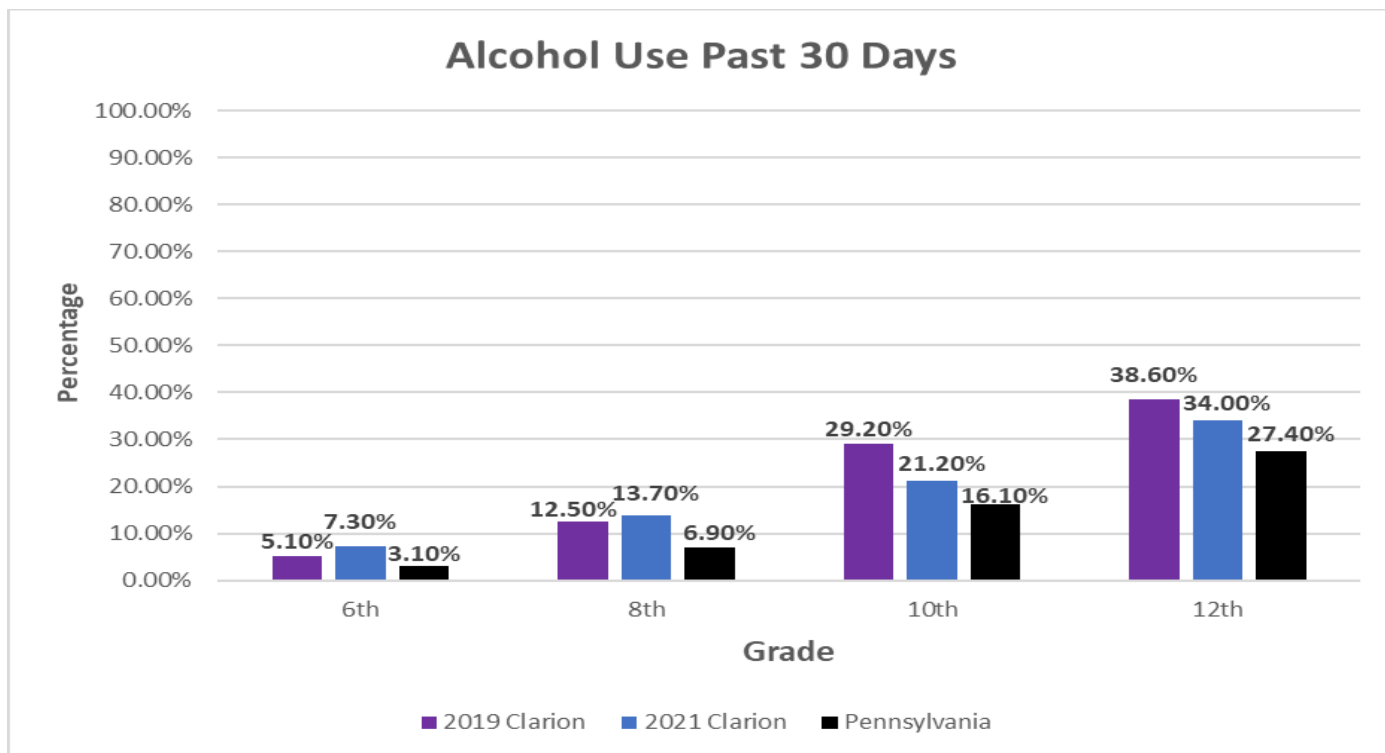
- In comparison to the 2019 PAYS data, the percentage usage of cigarettes has declined for 10<sup>th</sup> graders by 10.9% (27.5%-2019, 16.6%-2021) and 12<sup>th</sup> graders by 9 % (43.6%-2019, 34.6%-2021).
- Unfortunately, Clarion County had a higher percentage of students using cigarettes in their lifetime at all grades in comparison to state levels.





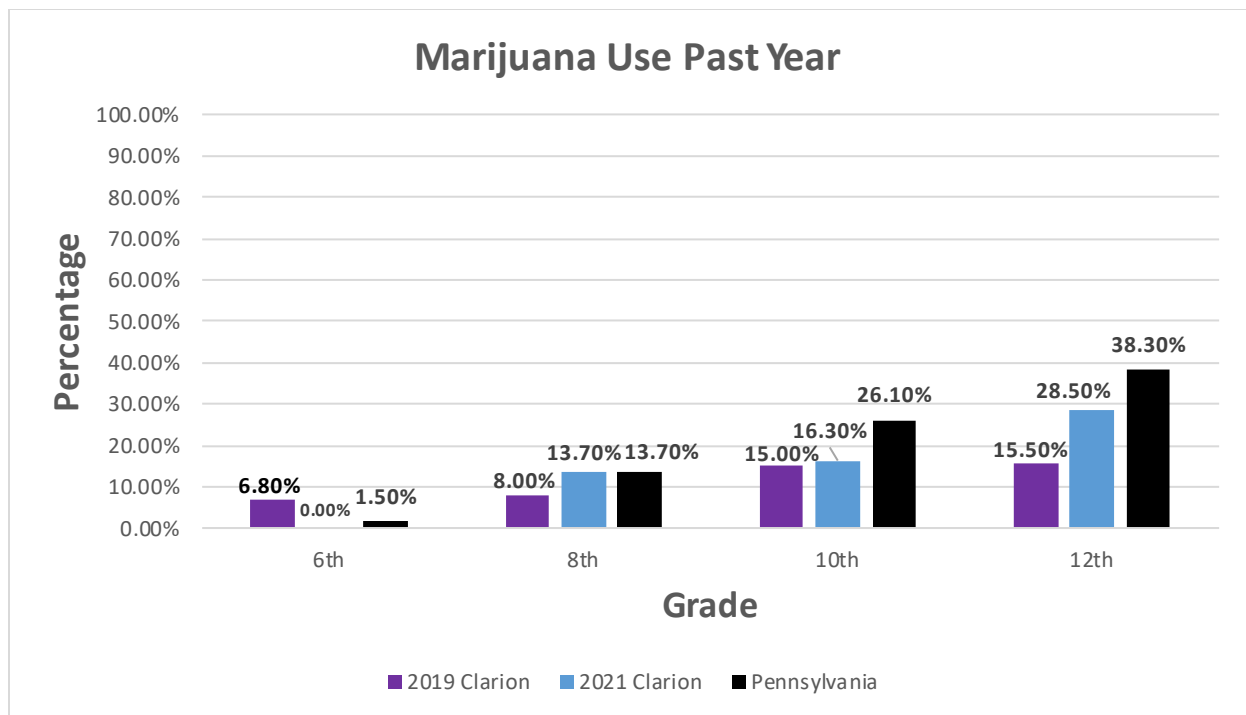
**FIGURE 10: PAYS-Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Have Used Vaping/E-Cigarettes Within the Past 30 Days**

- In comparison to the 2019 PAYS data there was decline in vaping and e-cigarette use at all grade levels (grade 6-decrease by 3.5%, grade 8-decrease by 4.1%, 10 grade-decrease by 17.5% and 12 grade- decrease by 6.9%).
- Even with this decline in vaping, the 12<sup>th</sup> grade Clarion County students are 17 % higher than the 12<sup>th</sup> grade state average.
- However, while these reductions are positive, the reported vape-e-cigarette usage in the past 30 days is higher in Clarion County than the state for all grades.
- Most Clarion County school districts have installed vaping detectors and provide school-wide vaping programs that warn students about the negative health impact of vaping.



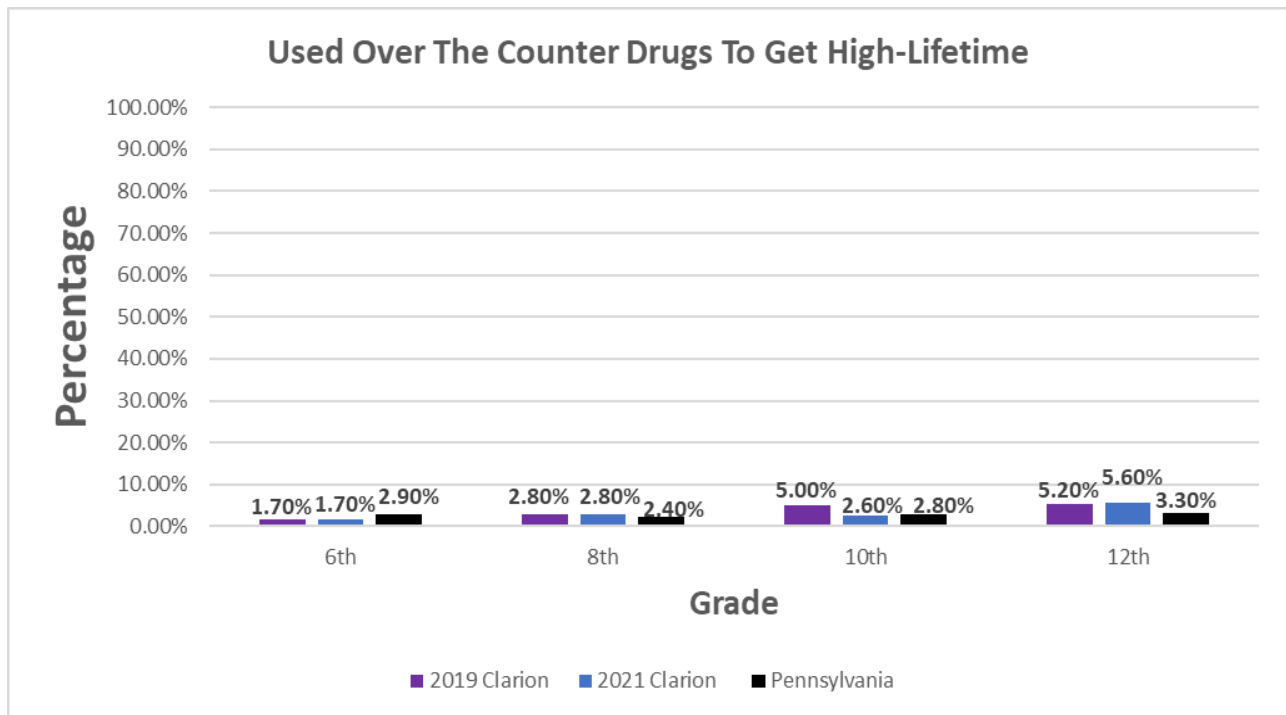
**FIGURE 11: PAYS-Percent Of Students In Clarion County Who Have Used Alcohol In The Past 30 days**

- Analysis of PAYS data from 2019 to 2021 indicates a decline in alcohol use within the past 30 days for the 12th-grade and 10th-grade cohorts, with a respective decrease of 4.6% and 8%. However, the 8th-grade and 6th-grade cohorts experienced an increase in usage, with a 1% uptick in the 8th-grade cohort and a 2.2% increase in the 6th-grade cohort.
- Alcohol consumption rates in 6<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, and 12<sup>th</sup> grades during the past 30 days of students in Clarion County are higher than the Pennsylvania average.



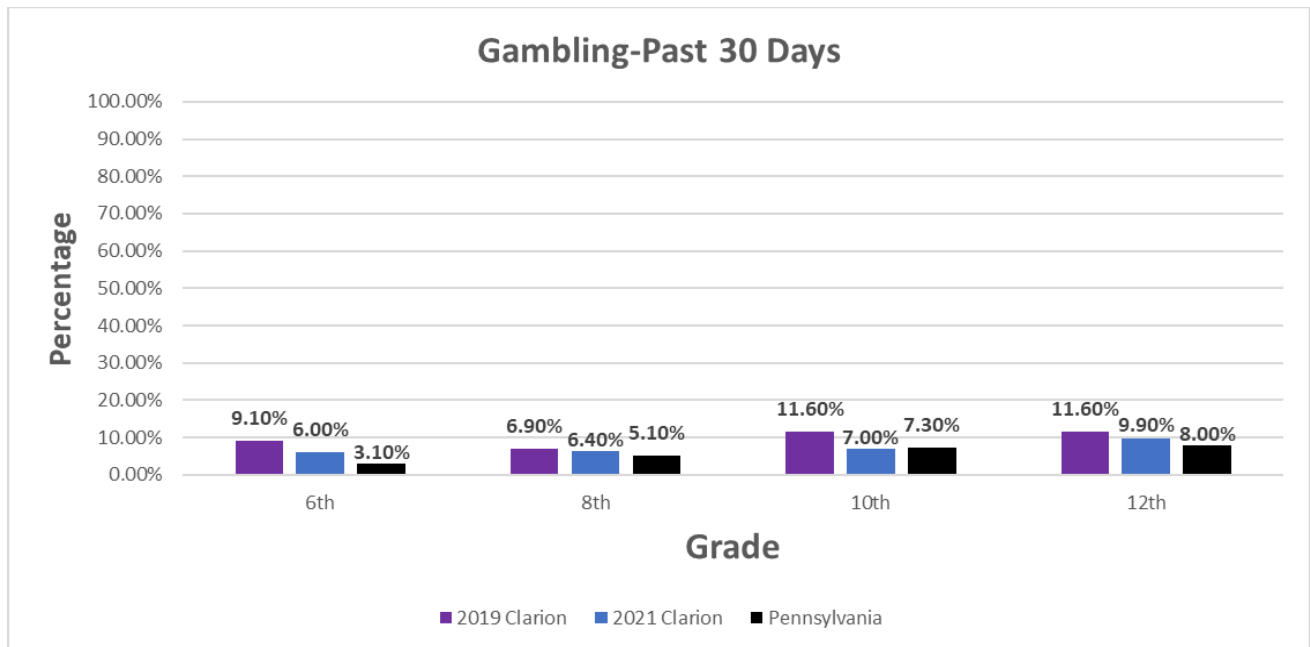
**FIGURE 12: PAYS- Percentage Of Students In Clarion County Who Have Used Marijuana/ Hash Oil In The Past Year**

- There were no reports of marijuana use amongst 6<sup>th</sup> graders while the state average for this grade was 1.5%.
- In contrast, 8<sup>th</sup> graders witnessed an increase in usage, rising from 8% to 13.7% from 2019 to 2021, aligning with the state average of 13.7%.
- 12<sup>th</sup> graders reported a substantial increase from 15.5% in 2019 to 28.5% in 2021. However, this figure remains below the state average of 38.3%. These findings underscore the importance of considering grade-specific dynamics and tailoring targeted interventions to address marijuana use among students in Clarion County.
- All Clarion County School Districts have in-house staff members who are Student Assistance Program (SAP) trained teams, which work closely with students and families in the preventions of drugs programs.

- PAYS data in 2019 to 2021 indicates a sustained pattern of usage for 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade levels.
- For 6<sup>th</sup> graders, the percentage of those using over-the-counter drugs to get high remained constant at 1.7% from 2019 to 2021, positioning them below the state average of 2.9%.
- 8<sup>th</sup> graders showed no meaningful change over this period, with 2.8% using over the counter drugs to get high, placing them above the state average of 2.4%.
- 10<sup>th</sup> graders demonstrated a decrease in usage, declining from 5% in 2019 to 2.6% in 2021, below the state average of 2.8%.
- 12<sup>th</sup> graders experienced an increase in usage from 5.2% in 2019 to 5.6% in 2021, above the state average of 3.3%. These trends emphasize the importance of tailored interventions and preventive measures to address specific grade-level dynamics associated with over-the-counter drug use for recreational purposes.

- In 2019, 9.1% of 6th graders reported gambling in the past 30 days (about 4 and a half weeks), a figure that decreased to 6% in 2021. Despite this reduction, it remains above the state average of 3.1%.
- 8th graders exhibited a slight decrease from 6.9% in 2019 to 6.4% in 2021, surpassing the state average of 5.1%.
- 10th graders experienced a significant decline in gambling from 11.6% in 2019 to 7% in 2021, falling below the state average of 7.3%.
- 12th graders, while showing improvement from 11.6% in 2019 to 9.9% in 2021, still exceeded the state average of 8%. These findings suggest a need for targeted interventions and preventive measures to address gambling behaviors among students, considering the nuanced dynamics observed across different grade levels in the county.

## Community Survey

To reach as many community members as possible within different groups, Independence Health System-Clarion hospital distributed the survey using a range of methods. Electronic surveys and paper surveys were distributed. The surveys were promoted through focus groups, emails and office visits. The online version could be accessed from a link or QR code, which was the main source of incoming surveys, while paper surveys were distributed where there was limited internet access.

The Independence Health System-Clarion employees were also asked to fill out the community health survey. The community survey was also distributed to outpatient physician offices for additional data collection. 208 surveys were completed by the community members. The survey consisted of questions relating to the individual's health status and overall community's health status, along with other factors linked to health such as demographics and food consumption. The following are some of the results found through the survey.

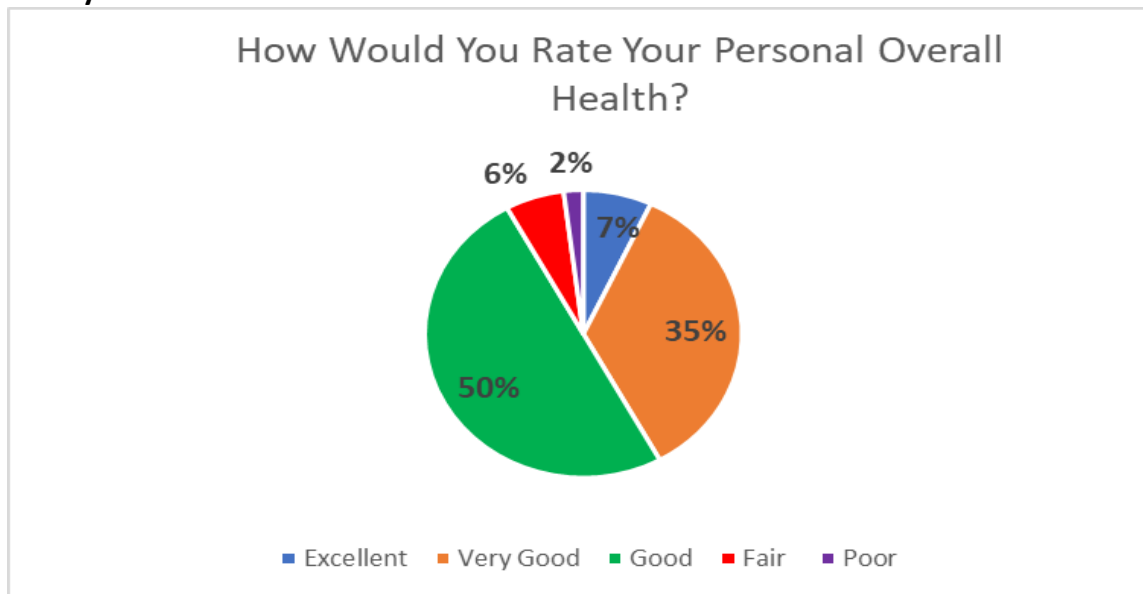
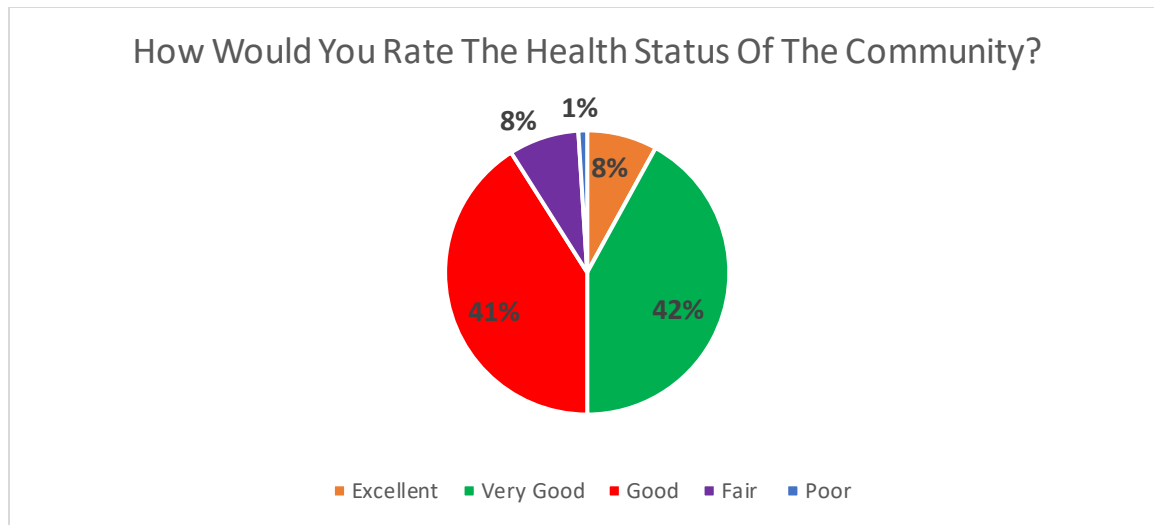


Figure 15: Community –Personal Health Status

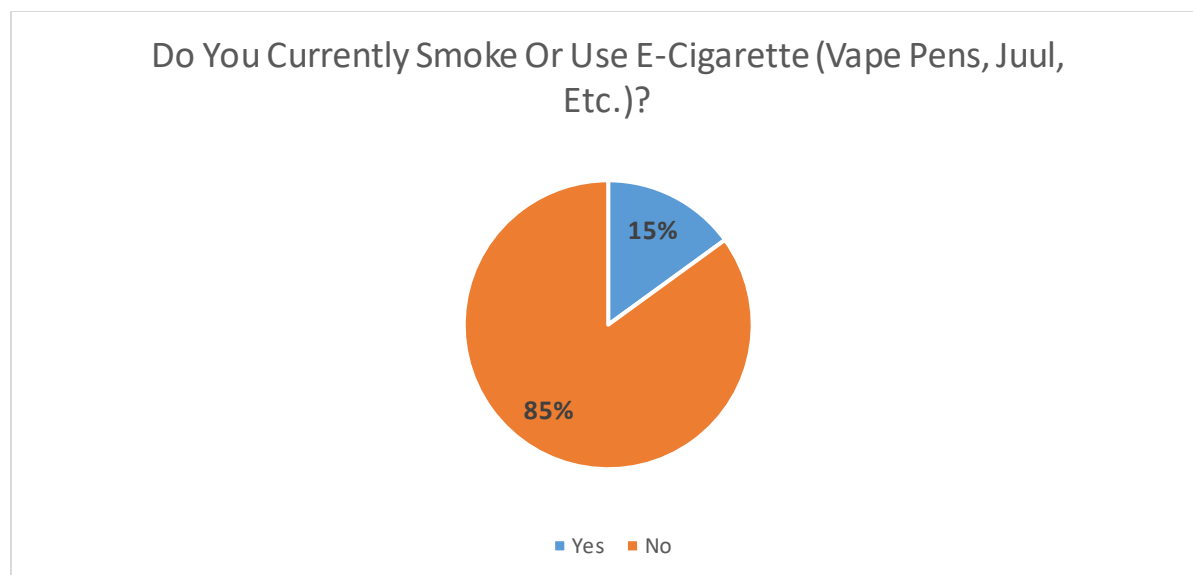

- Most of the community members surveyed do not smoke or use e-cigarettes (85%)

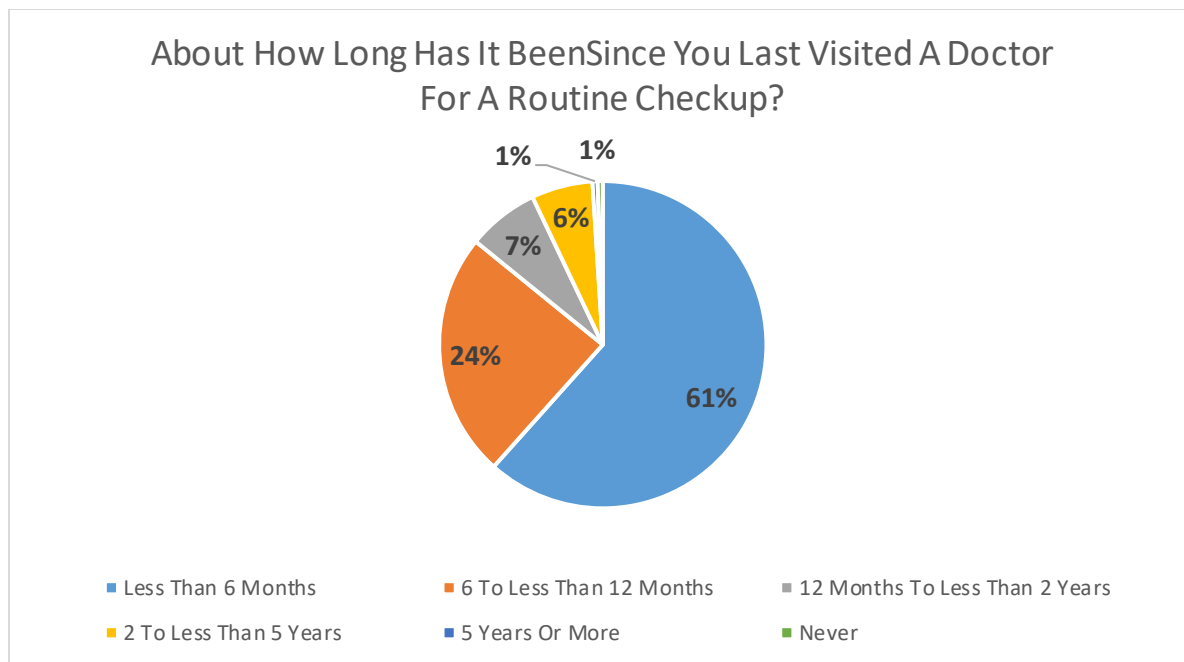


Figure 18: Community – Routine Check-Up

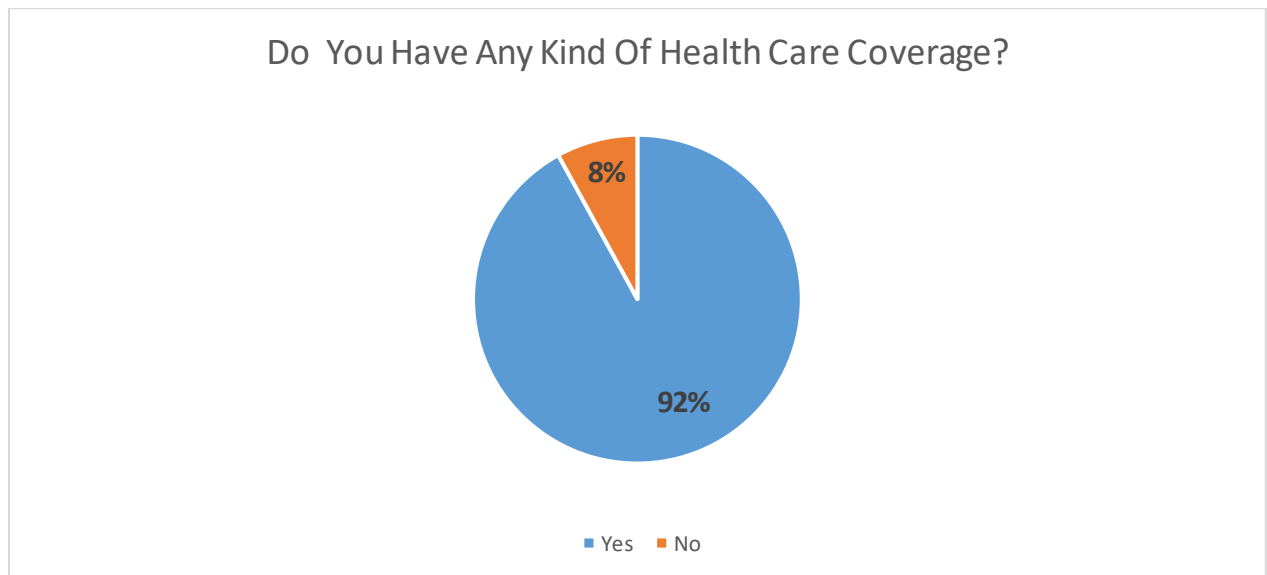


Figure 19: Community – Health care coverage

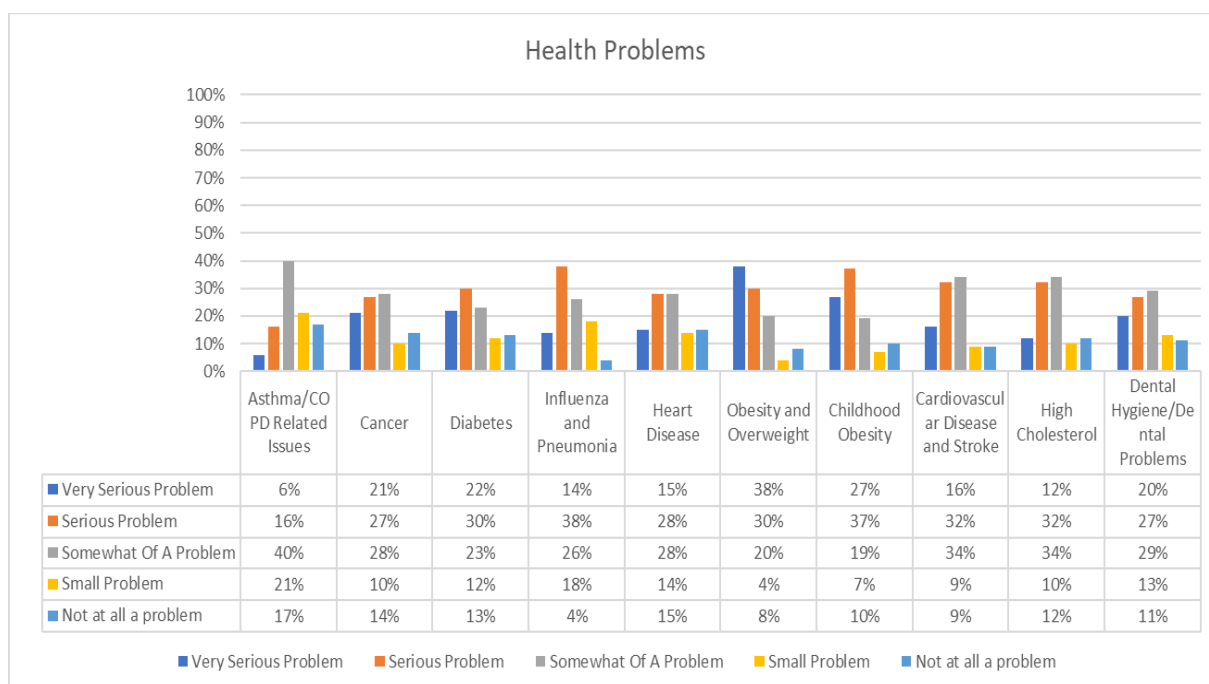

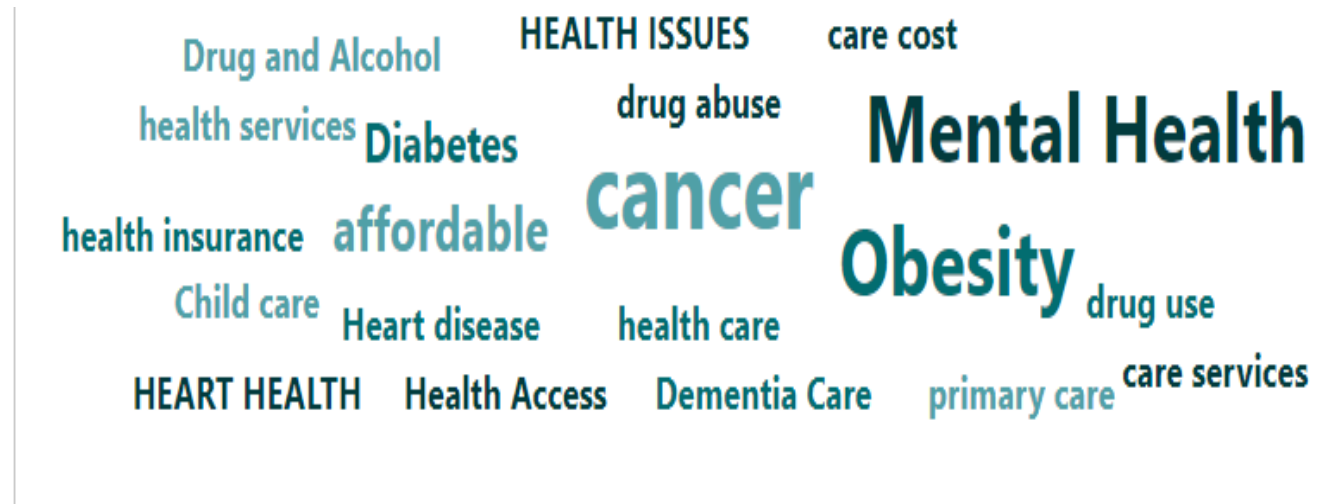


Figure 24: Community – Health Priorities

## Stakeholder Survey

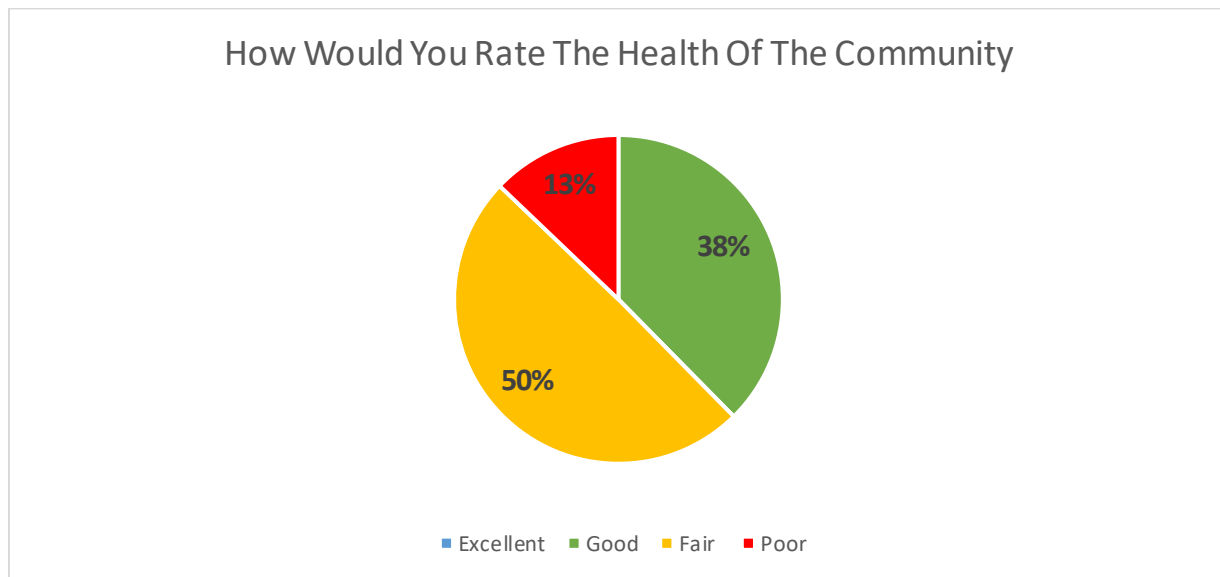
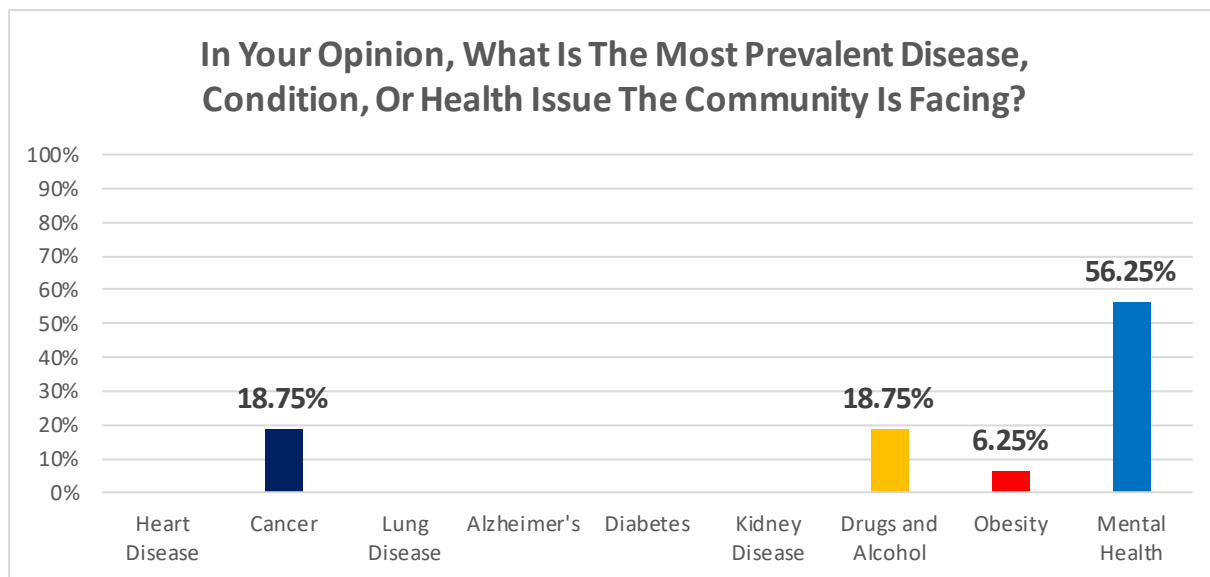


Figure 25: Stakeholder – Overall Health Status

# What Do You Think Are The Top 3 Community Health Needs For Clarion County?

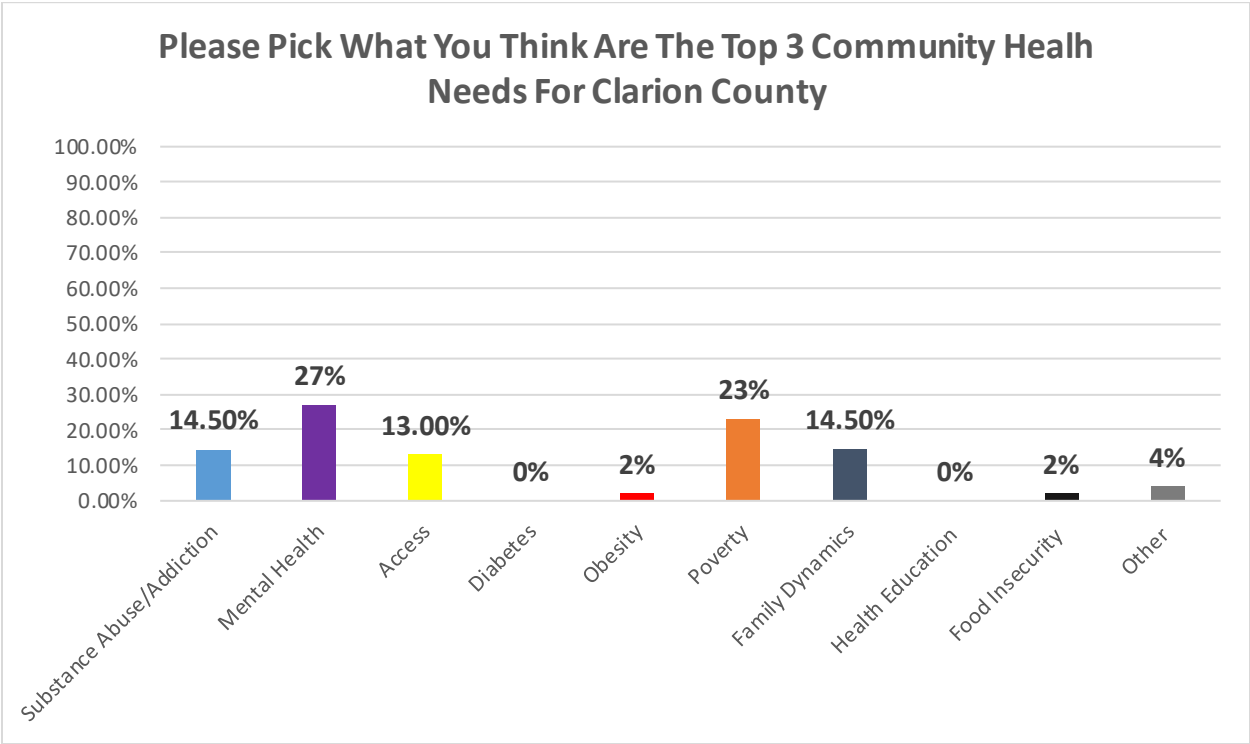


Figure 27: Stakeholder – Top health needs

## **Focus Groups**

Clarion hospital conducted three focus groups with members of the community and the community health needs assessment team. The focus groups reviewed the primary and secondary data collected from surveys to evaluate opportunities for Clarion Hospital to collaborate with the community to address the identified issues. The first group consisted of pastors in the Clarion community, the second group consisted of PennWest Clarion University students, and the third group was comprised of school leaders including superintendents, principals, guidance counselors and school nurses.

### **Focus Group One**

The first focus group consisted of seven pastors from Clarion and surrounding communities and was held on September 6<sup>th</sup>, 2023. Overall, the pastors rated the health of the community as fair. They were concerned about the rate of obesity in the community, poor nutrition habits and the increased fast-food consumption. They discussed several social determinants of health factors that affect the health of their community including generational poverty, limited affordable housing and too few mental health providers in the area. Other issues of concern were domestic violence, child abuse, delinquency/youth crime and affordable health care with increasing co-pays and deductibles. On a positive note, there are more people joining and attending the local YMCA, which indicates there are those working to improve their overall health.

This focus group provided potential solutions to some of their concerns including increasing access to mental health services and increased education about nutrition resources and services throughout the county. Also, the pastors want to collaborate and become more involved in initiatives that address mental health efforts, food insecurity and nutrition programs, and substance abuse programs.

### **Focus Group Two**

The second focus group consisted of 24 college students from PennWest Clarion University majoring in Nutrition and Fitness. The meeting was held on November 7, 2023, on the Penn West campus. Although they perceived the health of the Clarion community to be fair to good, the three main concerns they expressed were drug and alcohol usage, crime in the community, and mental health issues. They attributed the overuse of drugs and alcohol and vaping to lack of recreational activities, social opportunities, and employment struggles.

The students elaborated on the mental health issues they see and experience. They often experience stress due to balancing studies, family, finances, career, and social pressures. They felt that social media played a significant role in the mental health challenges that people face due to the pressures and comparative culture it promotes. Specific to the students at PennWest, they felt the merger and virtual classes contribute to the stress levels they experience as it is difficult to cultivate social experience networks and schedule classes with this type of college environment.

Safety was also reported as a concern while students are waiting for public transportation or shopping at grocery stores. Students stated they felt unsafe at times due to encounters with residents who were under the influence of drugs.

Potential solutions discussed included increasing mental health/counseling personnel both virtually and in person, improving awareness of available resources for drug and alcohol issues, increasing recreational opportunities by working with the University Activities Board and starting a food pantry on

campus that includes affordable and healthy options and offering classes that include meal planning and healthy cooking on a budget.

### **Focus Group Three**

At the end of January, the third focus group consisted of area school leaders including high school principals, school superintendent, guidance counselors and school nurses met.

As with the previous focus groups, the health of the community was rated as fair to good. They acknowledged the issues of poor nutrition, limited access to healthy foods, sedentary lifestyles, substance abuse, reliance on technology, lack of family structure and rules, limited mental health services, and neglect of dental and vision care as areas of concern.

The lack of easy access to specialists and mental health therapists for the pediatric population is troubling as the schools are seeing a rise in abuse and domestic violence, and aggressive behaviors in children.

Some members of the focus group suggested establishing facilities near underserved areas to improve access to services and resources. One thought was to educate young people on several topics including parenting skills, healthy meal planning, job training and financial sustainability. This group summarized three approaches to developing strategies that will address community health needs including identifying and activating available resources, lobbying, and working with government officials for support, and prioritizing mental health treatment.

## **2024 Goals**

### **Behavioral Health & Substance Abuse**

- Seek, support, and establish community partnerships that enhance and expand behavioral health and substance abuse services.

### **Food Insecurity**

- Provide education and access to community resources that promote well-balanced nutrition and healthy eating habits.

### **Healthy Lifestyles**

- Support and enhance physical activity and nutrition programs to better manage chronic disease within our communities.
